Paul E. Ceruzzi is Curator of the Smithsonian Institution's Air and Space Museum. In addition to *Internet Alley*, he has authored *A History of Modern Computing* (2nd ed., MIT Press, 2003) and other books and is co-editor of *The Internet and American Business* (MIT Press 2008). Ceruzzi has a B.A. from Yale University and a Ph.D. from the University of Kansas in American Studies.
